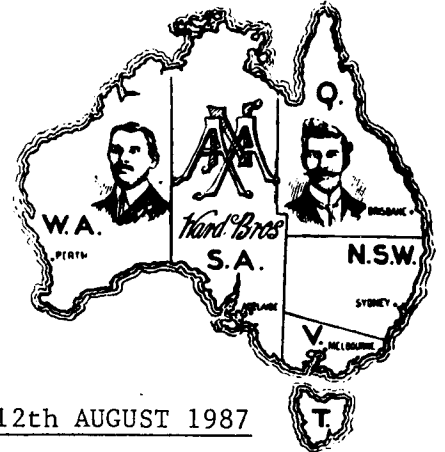

19th A.G.M. - 12th AUGUST 1987

The Society had a long and interesting Annual General Meeting this year.

The President's report, which is included with this Bulletin, summarised a busy year for the Society.

The Treasurer's Report showed that we made a small operating loss during the year, but that we are still in a good position to fund any campaigns which become necessary in the future.

Neil Macindoe's Planning Report pointed out several developments which have enhanced our area in recent months and pointed the way to continue this trend, including a resolution regarding the Homoeopathic Hospital. (See Page 3.)

John Buckingham, reporting on the Bicentennial Park and Marina, explained that these two proposals are now completely linked. Mr Brereton will not hand over land for the Park until all planning stages for the Marina have been passed. There is a worrying possibility that the decision to proceed with the Park will come too late for the project to qualify for Bicentennial funding.

Details of the Development Application for the Marina are on display at the Council offices until mid - September, from 8.30am to 4.30pm Monday - Friday and John urged members to inspect them. The Sub-committee will make yet another submission in response to the Development Application.

our concern about the increasing pressures on our suburb and referred to the recent 40-plus page response of the Leichhardt Municipal Council to the Society's efforts.

The election of Officers then took place. The new Committee, full details of which are shown on the back page of the Bulletin, is fired up with enthusiasm to make the Society an even stronger voice in our community.

A PLANNING REPORT

It was suggested at the A.G.M. that long-standing planning matters receive a progress report from time to time.

1. WATERFRONT FACTORY AT THE END OF GLEBE POINT ROAD - Development consent has expired. Within foreshore protection area.
2. JOHN FLETCHER CONTAINER YARD - Increasingly disruptive activity. No reaction by Council to the Society's complaints.
3. FACTORIES AT 10 JAROCIN AVENUE / 208 BRIDGE ROAD - Development Application re-submitted with some noise controls.

THE HOMOEOPATHIC HOSPITAL

The following motion was passed unanimously at the recent Annual General Meeting:

"The A.G.M. of the Glebe Society suggests that Prince Alfred Area Health Board retain Sydney Homoeopathic Hospital for the medical care of senior citizens not sufficiently ill to require admission to a major public hospital and for minor operations.

The Society requests that in any redevelopment the unsightly red brick offices on Glebe Point Road be removed and that any new building be sited well back from the busy roads and be sympathetic to the existing main building. The Society also requests that the palms sold to Alpine Nurseries at Dural be returned. The chain wire fence should be removed and benches provided in an area of open space near the palms."

HAROLD PARK HOTEL REDEVELOPMENT

The proposal is a very mediocre one. It involves the loss of the prominent terrace house on the corner of Wigram Road and Minogue Crescent. None of the Society's suggested improvements have been incorporated.

LEICHHARDT COUNCIL LOSES CONTROL OF STRIDES' YARD

The Department of Planning and Environment has revoked the care and control of the waterfront section of Strides' Yard, Blackwattle Bay, given to Leichhardt Council in March. Council had refused to develop the area as open space, bleating about the cost of retaining the crane marked for preservation by the Heritage Council. The D.E.P. will retain the area for parkland.

BALMAIN ASSOCIATION GIVES US SUPPORT

The Committee of the Balmain Association have written letters to the Minister for Local Government and to the Glebe newspaper supporting our Society in our dealings with Mr Eggins, the Town Clerk of Leichhardt Municipal Council. They referred in the letters problems similar to ours which they have experienced with Mr Eggins.

LEICHHARDT COUNCIL AMONGST THE WORST

Hawkesbury and Blacktown are Greater Sydney's worst-performing councils, with heavy debts, higher-than-average rates and the prospect of cuts in their services or increases in charges, according to a controversial independent analysis of their performances.

The report, Local Government Activities and Finances, names North Sydney followed by Hurstville as the best-performing councils in the Greater Sydney area.

Based on figures gathered by the Australian Bureau of Statistics for its 1985 study of local government finances, the report examines each council's amount of long-term debt as a proportion of its revenue, its annual interest-rate bill, degree of reliance on government grants, and attempts to gather funds in addition to rates.

Mr Sainsbury said that a number of councils could be criticised for their financial performances over the past few years.

Other poorly performing councils, according to the report, are Botany, Campbelltown, Marrickville, Drummoyne, Lane Cove, Leichhardt, Blue Mountains and Hunters Hill.

And other councils whose performance is among the best are Warringah, Camden, Wyong, Gosford, Ku-ring-gai, Fairfield, Ryde and Woollahra.
