Two Major Development Proposals Threaten Glebe

On Thursday 5 August, over 150 local residents filled the upstairs meeting room in the Glebe Town Hall to discuss two major proposals for developments in Rozelle Bay. One is for the proposed Sydney Slipways boat repair and maintenance facility, which apart from other adverse effects would mar the view of the Anzac Bridge. The other is a facility for dry storage of 850 vessels on the northern side of Rozelle Bay proposed to be built where the existing tall grey coloured Hobbs shed stands.

As these proposals would be on land within the Leichhardt Council area, the Mayor of Leichhardt, Alice Murphy, and two of her Councillors were there. Two City of Sydney Councillors, Robyn Kemmis & Verity Firth, also attended, as the developments would affect their residents just across a narrow bay, in Glebe.

Some good news was given to the Meeting by Jane Spring, President of the University of Sydney Women's Rowing Club. This was the decision of the Minister for Transport, Michael Costa, to scrap the Bank Street powerboat ramp under the Anzac Bridge in Blackwattle Bay (Herald, 6 August, page 5).

However, the Sydney Harbour Draft Regional Environmental Plan still permits boat ramps, as well as commercial marinas, to be developed in Rozelle and Blackwattle Bays.

These developments, as well as the proposed boat repair facility, would make all types of navigation in the narrow Bays more

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hazardous, especially near the bottleneck entry of the old Glebe Island Bridge.

Such developments are especially dangerous for the two rowing clubs and numerous dragon boats that train on the Bays. These hand propelled craft are easily flooded or capsized by the wake of motorised vessels as well as being easily hit, for rowers and canoeists sit much lower in the water and are often not seen until it's too late.

For these reasons and many more, the packed public meeting called on the State Government to remove the W1 Maritime Waters Zoning from both Rozelle and Blackwattle Bays. This would result in developments such as ramps and marinas not being permitted, as they are incompatible with the safety of the current users.

In addition, the public meeting requested the scaling down and redesign of the boat repair facility because of its impact on that Sydney icon, the Anzac Bridge.

These motions were carried unanimously and forwarded to Mr Craig Knowles, Minister for Infrastructure, Planning and Natural Resources, to require all proposals to be assessed by the Local Councils, to ensure the community is properly informed, consulted and considered in relation to development proposals for the Bays. The Councils, who are accustomed to consulting with residents, are in a far better position to make a decision, rather than a decision being made by the Sydney Harbour and Foreshore Authority (SHFA), which is too closely identified with exploiting the waterfront for commercial gain.

By entrusting assessment to Local Councils the rights of existing users of the Bays and nearby residents will be better protected and the use of Sydney Harbour shared more fairly.

The Glebe Society Glebe Point Residents Group Save Rozelle Bay Association

Final motion of the Public Meeting, held at the Glebe Town Hall, 160 St Johns Road, Glebe, NSW, on Thursday 5 August 2004 (passed unanimously).

This meeting of residents of Glebe, Annandale, Balmain, Ultimo, Pyrmont and White Bay calls on the Minister for Infrastructure, Planning and Natural Resources to require the modification of the proposed Development Application by Sydney Slipways for a boat lift and repair operation in Rozelle Bay so that it will operate within normal business hours only, and so that no building on the site, by reason of its position, scale, form or height, will impair the view of and through the Anzac Bridge, or visually impact on the Bridge or preclude unrestricted public access to the immediate foreshore area.

This meeting declares the pre-Development Application notification and consultation with respect to this proposal to be totally inadequate and unacceptable. In order to ensure both pre-and post-DA notification and consultation is adequate, this meeting requests the Minister to remove the assessment process from Sydney Harbour Foreshore Authority in its entirety and invest it in the local government authority within whose boundaries it lies, in this case Leichhardt Council. In addition we request that this be done with respect to all subsequent DAs for Rozelle and Blackwattle Bays.

Furthermore, this meeting notes, the Draft Sydney Harbour Foreshore Regional Environmental Plan and Draft Development Control Plan include Rozelle and Blackwattle Bays in Zone W1, which permits development of commercial marinas and powerboat ramps. This zoning is totally at odds with the current recreational, commercial and industrial uses of the Bays and is completely unacceptable to residents.

Therefore this meeting insists Blackwattle and Rozelle Bays be removed from the W1 Zoning, and the draft planning instruments be amended so that development of marinas and powerboat ramps in the Bays is specifically prohibited in both the REP and DCP, and that any future development in the Bays be required to be assessed by the appropriate local government authority.

The Old Fire Station

A hub for the community, among a number of exciting community initiatives.....

The year of 2004 has seen the continued work of Department of Housing occurring alongside residents and agencies in Glebe to further develop the local community. The appointment in February of a Community Development Officer has enabled the establishment of strong partnerships with local organisations including the Glebe Society, Families First, Glebe PCYC, the Glebe Estate Community Church, Sydney University and staff from the City of Sydney Council.

While supporting the Glebe Estate Community Action Plan at a grass-roots level, this appointment has enabled a number of initiatives to 'get off the ground' including the development of a 'hub' for the community; the Old Fire Station People's Hall in Mitchell Street.

The Mitchell Street Hall was identified as a meeting place for community activities, with the Department significantly upgrading the hall to provide local community groups with facilities including a fully equipped kitchen and servery, computer desks and equipment and an upgraded courtyard. A growing number of groups and initiatives are taking full advantage of the great facility including:

- * Middle Aged Dames (MAD) which was formed in February 2004, in response to a local woman who identified the need for a friendship and activities group for middle aged women living on the Glebe Estate. This group recently applied for a City of Sydney Council Local Community Grant to undertake a Furniture Recycling Workshop & Old Fire Station Courtyard Project. This group meets at the hall from 10.00am to 12.00 midday every Tuesday.

- * The 'Have a Chat' Café & Community Centre, which successfully opened on 29 July, and is staffed by local volunteers serving hot coffees with a smile and of course a chat! This initiative is auspiced by the Glebe Estate Community Church in partnership with the Dept of Housing. The 'Have a Chat' Café & Community Centre, through the use of local volunteers will be a gathering place offering a limited range of low cost beverages and cakes. The cafe does not seek to replicate the cafe culture of Glebe which offers a full range of beverages and refreshments. The Cafe will focus on Glebe Estate residents and will be a base for a range of community initiatives. It will be a community centre with a cafe at its core value and service. Its open hours are Thursday and Friday from 10.00am to 3.00pm.

- * Glebe Estate Bingo. For over 12 years, Mrs Marian Stanwell and local group members have run a very happy and successful Bingo meeting every Wednesday with food prizes at the hall. In February 2004, the Department started working with these wonderful local residents to ensure that Bingo meetings could continue with support from the local housing team.

- * In 2003, the Department established an Aboriginal Elders Meeting Place in a refurbished terrace house at 113 Mitchell Street, Glebe. The Department is working with the Inner West Aboriginal Community Company Ltd and local Indigenous tenants to establish the meeting place as a base for cultural and community activities. IWACC has recently received a grant from the Aboriginal Housing Office to start the Billabunga Project, to provide an Aboriginal Elders gathering and art group on a fortnightly basis.

In addition to the variety of initiatives that are based at this new community Hall, the Department of Housing continues to work with tenants on a range of community issues including the Glebe & Balmain Neighbourhood Tenant Forum. This Forum brings together tenants and relevant government and community representatives to improve the quality of life for people living on the Glebe Estate and in Balmain. Neighbourhood tenant representatives have been elected by tenants to represent them and assist in raising issues with the Department. The Forum members have also initiated community activities including local newsletters, competitions, fund raising and tenant involvement in other working groups. Tenant representatives meet with the Department of Housing four times a year and all tenants are welcome to attend meetings.

Also working on issues of importance to the community is the Glebe Area Tenants Group (GATG). This group, which meets on the last Monday of every month at the Old Fire Station People's Hall, helps local people stay informed about public housing issues and develops social and recreational activities for the benefit of the group.

Representatives of Families First, Glebe Society, Glebe PCYC and City of Sydney Council have been meeting on a regular basis to discuss improving access to sport for children on the Glebe Estate.

Initiatives previously undertaken by

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local partnerships include the On the Move Program which is run at the Glebe PCYC and provides after school activities for 11-13 year old children. The Centipede After Care Program has also started a Girls Space Program for local girls and the Glebe PCYC has started a lunchtime Touch Footy skills clinic at Glebe Public School. They are also thinking about a basketball clinic.

Earlier this year, the Department of Housing and the University of Sydney (School of Social Work and Policy Studies) entered into an exciting new partnership that aims to work with the diverse range of stakeholders in Glebe to increase community capacity. Now into its sixth month, the key areas in which the Glebe Community Development Project has focused on are;

* Strengthening links between local schools and community services,

* supporting residents of the Glebe Estate to plan for the establishment of a local IT facility at the Old Fire Station People's Hall,

* working with the early literacy group to establish the Glebe Book Exchange,

* commencing work on developing a spatial social profile of Glebe, and

* Working with others to establish a local group that increases coordination across Glebe and Forest Lodge.

The Glebe Community Development Project is currently located at the University. However they hope to establish an office in Glebe in the near future. For further information please phone **Ally de Pree-Raghavan on 9036 5371**.

From the terraces

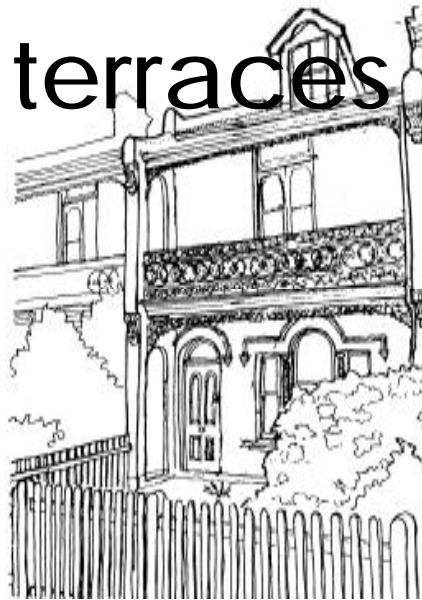
Have you ever wandered along Mansfield Street and wondered who...?

George Allen Mansfield (1834-1908) was one of the founders of and first President of the Institute of Architects of New South Wales. He was the first native-born Australian to be elected a fellow of the Royal Institute of British Architects.

Mansfield as an architect embraced the Victorian Gothic, Mannerist and Free Classical styles.

In Glebe, we can see his work in:

- * Alterations and additions (c1880) to *Toxteth House* (1831, architect John Verge). Whilst some might regret the fact that this turned a two-storey restrained Regency villa into a three-storey building, complete with tower, in the Italianate manner, the latter was a style beloved by Victorians.
- * *Toxteth Lodge* (late 1870s)
- * Many cottages in Glebe, due to his association with the Allen family, including *Emslee* (c1857) (27 Mansfield Street)

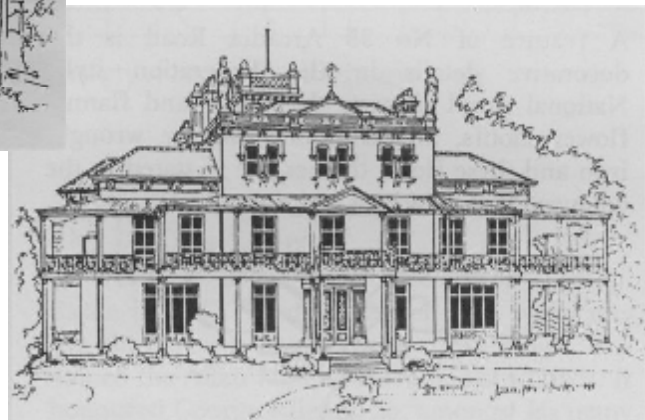


Nearby, his work can be seen at :

- * Marrickville, Newtown and Petersham Public Schools (Mansfield designed over 100 schools between 1867 and 1879, as NSW Council of Education Architect)
- * House for George Oakes at 133 Macquarie Street (1871)(now *History House*)
- * Commercial Bank of Sydney (1876-78), 744 George Street (now *Haymarket Library*)
- * Central Pavilion (1882), Royal Prince Alfred Hospital

* *Macleay Museum* (1884), University of Sydney

The march of progress has removed Mansfield's original Glebe Public School (demolished), the AMP Building at 87 Pitt Street (now Australia Square) and the Australia Hotel (63 Castlereagh Street)(now the MLC building).

Who Lived in Your Street?

Edna Ryan (1904-1997) Political Activist and Famous Fighter for the Rights of Women

Along Cook Street, joining Glebe Point Road and Blackwattle Bay, old and new dwellings sit side by side: terrace houses, a large stone dwelling and a number of older and newer blocks of flats. For the ten years from 1980 to 1990 Edna Ryan lived in one of the older blocks of units. In 1984, hundreds of people filled the Glebe Town Hall to celebrate her 80th birthday.

This remarkable woman was born in Pymont, the tenth of twelve children. Although she won a bursary to attend Fort Street High School, there was no way the family could have afforded to send her to university. In fact she left school after four years when her mother became ill. Yet, towards the end of her life, she was awarded an honorary Doctorate of Letters from the University of Sydney (1985) and honorary Doctorate of Letters from Macquarie University (1995).

Edna Ryan worked tirelessly in causes related to the rights and wellbeing of women from an early age. She participated in the first International Women's Day in 1928. She organised the wives of timber workers in the 1929 strike. She was the first female deputy mayor in NSW in 1958 and the first woman president of the largest branch of the Municipal Employees' Union in the 1960s.

Edna Ryan's long involvement in the struggle for equal pay culminated in what many regard as her standout achievement, namely the submission she made to the Arbitration Commission in 1974 which led to low paid women workers being paid the same minimum wage as men. Her book written with Anne Conlon called *'The Gentle Invaders'* was published in 1975 and deals with the struggle of women for decent working conditions. Later she wrote *'Two Thirds of a Man'* (1984) which focuses on the discrimination women suffered in the laundry, retail and tobacco industries.

In a moving address 'Comments for Edna Ryan's Funeral', Susan Ryan (no relation), former Minister for Education in the Hawke Government and Minister Assisting the Prime Minister on the status of women said in part:

'Edna Ryan was the most inspiring and admirable woman I have known. Her life was full of remarkable ironies ... how remarkable that a woman, one of a large poor family, prevented from pursuing formal education, should be publicly recognized as one of the clearest thinkers about our industrial relations system ...'

Michael Golden, 'Architect'

When he died in 1872 Michael Golden was a landholder of substance. He owned much of Leichhardt Street at Glebe Point, *Sidcup*, a seven bedroom mansion with a library and dining, smoking, breakfast and ironing rooms, stable and coach house on the corner of Cook Street and Glebe Point Road (now units) and eight houses in Duncan Street (now gone) off Bathurst Street.

An assisted immigrant, Michael Golding landed in Sydney in January 1840 on board the *Crusader* from Dublin, accompanied by his parents, his wife Catherine and their three year old son Thomas. Michael was Roman Catholic, a carpenter and joiner. Within a few years he had modified his surname and his trade: by 1850 he was an 'architect'. (Before the Institute of Architects was founded in 1971 speculative builders could arm themselves with J Fergusson's *Illustrated Handbook of Architecture* and a couple of other textbooks and upgrade their status.)

The couple's first home was in George Street, where their second child Maria, conceived on the voyage out, was born. By 1853 the family included James, Jane, Sarah and Mary Jane. In 1844 Thomas won a prize for grammar at Mr Steel's Superior Infant Training School in Pitt Street. By 1842 Michael was on the electoral roll and by 1847 he had become sufficiently friendly with Thomas Barker (a miller and one of the richest men in Sydney; Michael bought part of Barker's original land grant in Bathurst Street) and Donald Larnach (a director of the Bank of NSW, he moved to London in 1853 to set up a branch there) for them to act as sureties in his bid to become the City of Sydney's first surveyor of buildings. In support of his application Michael offered, in lieu of qualifications or experience, acquaintance with some of the councillors. He got the job and remained with the

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council until his position was abolished in 1858. It was during this period that Michael made his money, perhaps not always honestly.

It was said he did business on the side, including work on St Mary's presbytery and chapel. John Davey, an architect who claimed the profession was degraded by 'mechanics, engineers, pirates and burglars', knew of a King Street property owner who had been told to demolish walls encroaching on the footpath but heard nothing more from Golden after enclosing five pounds in a letter of apology.

The City's Finance Committee had problems with his sloppy bookkeeping, particularly fees paid but not accounted for. Golden maintained he was constantly out on the streets, beneath the burning sun, enforcing the Building Acts, collecting fees, giving receipts, serving notices, keeping an eye on drains and rock blasting, valuing additions and alterations. He had no time for paperwork and couldn't be expected to compile weekly reports. Orders to employ a clerk were ignored. He did find time, however, to ask for a rise and to complain about his label 'Town Surveyor of Buildings'. He always signed his correspondence 'Surveyor of the City of Sydney' although Francis Clarke was the official 'City Surveyor'.

No doubt he had problems dealing with property owners who, avoiding fees, tried to hide any changes that they had made. Sometimes replaced fences strayed from their original positions. Samuel Holmes resisted directions to erect an iron roof, maintaining his shingles were of American oak, less flammable and superior to colonial wood. Golden said they were old flour casks cut in half.

In 1859 Michael was living in Woolloomooloo with a house and land at Glebe Point. During the next decade he acquired other houses in an area still fashionable despite the opening of the Glebe Island abattoir with its attendant smells, carcasses and manure washed ashore, and



circling sharks feeding on offal in the bloodstained water. In 1860 he enrolled in the Volunteer Defence Movement - nicknamed the 'Buffaloes' after an encounter with the Governor's bull in the Domain. For this he received further property: a grant of 50 acres at Glen Innes. 'One of the oldest volunteers in the colony' read his death notice, which also stated that he enrolled during the Crimean War, a flight of fancy as those battles were over by 1856.

What happened to Michael's property after his death was complicated by his will which left everything to his elder son and any male heirs. In the event of his death without male issue, it was to go to the next son and his male heirs. For a time the unmarried Thomas, also styled an 'architect', and his widowed mother lived in *Margaretta Cottage*, Leichhardt Street, before he moved to Duncan Street in the city and she was pensioned off on a pound a week by family members. Thomas himself died in 1879. Michael's wealth then passed to James, a 'gentleman' who lived in *Dellwood* (an eight-roomed stone cottage with servants' quarters and

stables - now a red brick block of units at 10 Leichhardt Street) with his wife and daughters 'actress' Lucie Eugenie and Florence.

The Golden estate was finally broken up with James' death in 1907. His sisters and their spouses auctioned the land, subdivided into 22 allotments, together with *Dellwood* and *Sidcup*. The houses did not sell on that occasion but the land did, several lots being bought by real estate agent Joseph Simpson, then living in *Venetia* [*Bellevue*] on the waterfront.

Michael Golden is not commemorated in any local place name, but a son-in-law is. Mary Jane married Horace Ricketts, hence Ricketts Avenue off Leichhardt Street.
